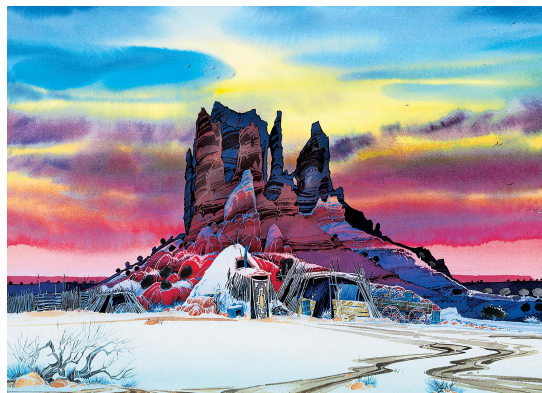

PYRAMID LAKE: North of here 16 miles is a dramatic inland sea, discovered in 1844 by Capt. John Fremont and Kit Carson. Sacred ground to the Piutes, it is an Indian reservation today. Here in 1860 white settlers forced war on the reluctant Piutes. Aroused, the Indians wiped out Major Ormsby's Militia, and in turn were crushed by troops rushed into the territory from the coast. The lake is a remnant of prehistoric Lake Lahontan, home of the Cui-Ui fish and a famous brooding ground for Pelicans and Cormorants. Native American Library Services Basic Grants Available for 2022

Application Deadline is March 1, 2022



WASHINGTON, DC—The Institute of Museum and Library Services is now accepting applications for [Native American Library Services Basic grants](#) through March 1, 2022.

Native American Library Services Basic grants are noncompetitive one-year grants of \$6,000 to \$10,000, which can include up to \$3,000 in eligible education and assessment activities or travel. The grants are available to federally recognized Native American tribes and Native Alaskan villages, corporations, and regional corporations and are designed to support existing operations and maintain core services of tribal and Native village libraries.

Grants may be used to buy library materials, fund salaries and training, provide internet connectivity and computers, or develop public and private partnerships with other agencies and community-based organizations, for example.

Libraries may request up to \$3,000 for staff to attend library courses or training workshops; attend or present at conferences related to library services; or hire consultants for onsite professional library assessments.

The space mission of a generation is set to depart Earth just a few days from now. The \$10 billion **James Webb Space Telescope aims to give humanity an entirely new perspective on our universe.** I asked our space reporter, Marina Koren, who has been tracking the excitement and controversy surrounding the launch for months, to share three things worth knowing ahead of the countdown.

1. The Webb telescope will be 100 times more powerful than Hubble.

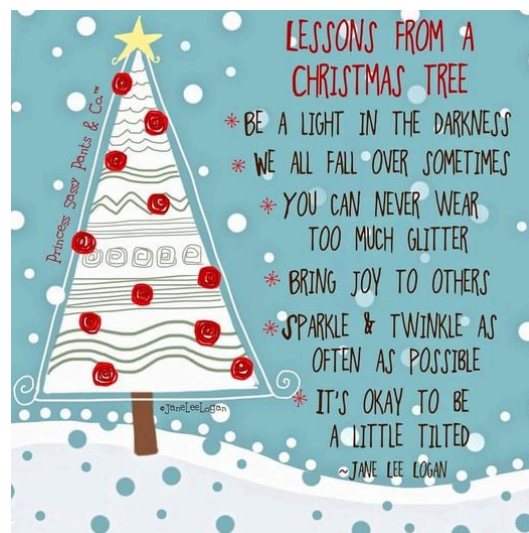
“While Hubble’s ‘deep field,’ the famous shot featuring thousands of galaxies, could fit on a standard sheet of paper,” Marina said, “Webb’s equivalent would be so expansive, one astronomer told me, that it would need to be printed on wallpaper.”

2. It will allow us to peer further back in time than ever before.

If all goes as planned, we’ll be able to see some of the first stars and galaxies that came into existence not long after the Big Bang. And “it’s possible—probable even—that Webb will uncover something that no one expected, the finding that rewrites everything.”

3. This will be the most complex deployment in the history of space exploration.

“It makes a Mars rover look like a toy car ... Too big to fit inside any existing rockets, Webb will leave Earth folded up and then unfurl piece by piece.”
