

For decades, scientists have poked deep holes a few miles apart across the California landscape, seeking to better understand the characteristics of the state's 515 groundwater basins in hopes of better managing and protecting them. In January of 2022, the Department of Water Resources (DWR) released their assessments of the groundwater sustainability plans for the critically overdrafted groundwater basins, approving eight of them and determining twelve to be incomplete. Those basins have until July 31, 2022 to correct the deficiencies and resubmit their plans to DWR or face possible intervention by the State Water Resources Control Board.



Calif. Irrigation District Loses Bid To Join River Ceremony Suit

Law360, 5/17/22 - A lawsuit over the U.S. government's refusal to release water for a Yurok Tribe river ceremony during drought conditions in 2020 will proceed without a local irrigation district, which a federal judge in California found Monday sought to litigate issues beyond the scope of that case.

In his ruling, U.S. District Judge William H. Orrick said the Klamath Irrigation District's intervention bid would have broadly implicated the northern California tribe's water rights, even as the tribe wants only to ensure the government provides enough water for its biennial ceremony.

California opens recycling plant to turn sewage into drinking water

Metro, 5/18/22 - As drought-stricken California prepares to restrict water usage for tens of millions of residents, a new water recycling plant could come to the rescue. The Los Angeles plant already cleans waste water, making it safe to go back into the ocean.

At the cost of \$4 billion dollars, it could also clean up to 150 million gallons a day to the standard of tap water, supplying the homes of around 500,000 people.

Interior authorizes \$240M for water infrastructure repair

Agri-Pulse Communications, 5/18/22 - The Interior Department is doling out more than \$240 million for repairs to aging water infrastructure in the drought-ridden West, one of the first investments with ramifications for agriculture in the \$1.5 trillion Bipartisan Infrastructure Law enacted last year.

The Bureau of Reclamation funding, which is aimed at repairing existing water infrastructure that is worn down and failing, will go towards 46 projects across 12 states, including repairs for irrigation pipes, aging canal liners and locks and other water-related repairs and overhauls.

Scientists find new and mysterious DDT chemicals accumulating in California condors

LA Times, 5/17/22 - When Christopher Tubbs joined an ambitious multinational effort to save California condors from the brink of extinction, he knew the odds of success were long. There were wind turbines that could strike the giant birds and lead bullet fragments in hunted animals that could sicken and kill.

But Tubbs, who studies hormone-disrupting chemicals, suspected there was yet another threat to condor survival — a particularly problematic pesticide dumped decades ago off California's coast.

Richmond: Point Molate to be sold for \$400 to Native American tribe after 270-acre development plan <u>fizzles</u>

The Guidiville Rancheria of California tribe and its developer, Upstream Point Molate, LLC, are now poised to purchase all of Point Molate's developable land on May 21 - for \$400.
