

From the Road Scholar

DAY 2 Wisconsin - Barkers Island Inn

Indigenous Community Learning and Engagement, Superior, Wisconsin

Activity note: 1.5 hours of walking and periods of standing during explorations, getting on and off motorcoach

Breakfast: At the hotel

Morning: After breakfast, we will travel by motorcoach to Wisconsin Point and Wisconsin Point Indian Burial Grounds. We will be met there by a local tribal historian and environmental scientist who will give us a presentation on the history and culture of this area. As early as the 1740's, Wisconsin point was home to the Fond du Lac Band of Lake Superior Chippewa and the site of the Wisconsin Point Indian Burial Grounds, which were recently returned to the Fond du Lac Band. Wisconsin Point is a three-mile-long natural sand spit in Superior, Wisconsin, that divides Allouez Bay from Lake Superior. Together, Wisconsin Point and Minnesota Point form one of the longest freshwater bay-mouth bars in the world. Forests of white and red pines fill the interior of Wisconsin Point, with sand dunes, wetlands, and beaches lining Lake Superior. The xeric forest on Wisconsin Point is an important stopover habitat for a diverse range of migratory birds, including many rare species.

Lunch: Nutritious Picnic Lunch

Afternoon: After lunch, we will visit the research project site of Great Lakes Indian Fish and Wildlife Commission (GLIFWC), where we will see a presentation given by a tribal environmental scientist. GLIFWC represents eleven Ojibwe tribes in Minnesota, Wisconsin and Michigan, providing natural resource management, conservation enforcement, legal and policy analysis and public information services regarding the Treaties of 1836, 1837, 1842 and 1854.

Dinner: This meal has been excluded from the program cost and is on your own to enjoy what you like. The Group Leader will be happy to offer suggestions!

Evening: After dinner, we will explore the SS Meteor: The SS Meteor is the last remaining above-water whaleback ship in the world! The whaleback freighter was designed by Captain Alexander McDougall and built here in Superior, Wisconsin. These ships, innovative for their time, earned the name "whaleback" for their cigar-shaped steel hulls that rode low in the water when loaded with cargo.

NOLA.COM: Millions of pounds of oyster shells are being recycled to help restore the Louisiana coast

New Orleans-area restaurants are turning discarded shells into restored oyster reefs by partnering with the Coalition to Restore Coastal Louisiana's Oyster Shell Recycling Program. The Program works with restaurants to collect oyster shells that would otherwise be headed to the landfill and puts them back to work for the coast where the shells become the building blocks for reef restoration projects. The Coalition works specifically with Indigenous communities, selecting project areas where they can help protect sites of special cultural and environmental significance. One example is playing out in Plaquemines Parish, in Adams Bay, where the coalition and its partners deployed 150 tons of shells to restore a reef to better protect what's known as the Lemon Tree Mound.

Report: Food as Medicine

- There is overwhelming evidence demonstrating the impact of food and diet on health, specifically among food-related diseases. Whether or not a poor diet can cause damage to the body should no longer be debated, as evidence supports the potential causal relationships between dietary factors and diet-related diseases such as ischemic heart disease, diabetes, and certain cancers. While diet has the potential to cause disease, it is also capable of building, maintaining, and restoring health. The report, written in conjunction with the Hunter College NYC Food Policy Center, aims to bridge the gap between traditional medicine and the use of food as medicine in the prevention and treatment of disease.

As part of the *America the Beautiful* initiative, the Biden-Harris administration launched Conservation.gov, a new website that helps connect people with information, tools, resources, and opportunities to support land and water conservation projects in communities across the country. Built through an interagency partnership between the Department of the Interior, the Department of Agriculture, the Department of Commerce's National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, and the White House Council on Environmental Quality, the website is a public information hub for staying updated on conservation efforts across the country, finding places to recreate outdoors or to volunteer on public lands, and applying for financial assistance in support of conservation projects. With more than 41 million acres already conserved, President Biden is on track to conserve more lands and waters than any president in history. In addition, through the President's Investing in America agenda, the Biden-Harris Administration invested more in conservation and restoration in the first two years of the administration than in any other.

This week, Acting Secretary Adrianne Todman will host HUD's second Tribal Intergovernmental Advisory Committee (TIAC) meeting here at the Weaver Building. Happening Wednesday and Thursday, the two-day convening will include Tribal leaders from across the continental United States and Alaska, focusing on Nation-to-Nation relationships with Tribal governments, Tribal Sovereignty, housing needs and challenges in Indian Country, and funding for Tribal housing and community development programs.

The committee, formed under the leadership of former Secretary Marcia Fudge, was born out of a 2021 Presidential memorandum directing all federal agencies to take actions to strengthen their policies and practices on Tribal consultation.
