# Flower farm could supply nickel for electric vehicle batteries

On a recent afternoon in northern Albania, workers gathered armfuls of freshly cut shrubs covered in yellow flowers, leaving them to dry in the sun like hay. But this was no ordinary harvest. The farm is both a mine, growing plants that accumulate nickel metal in their leaves and stems, and a carbon sink, its soil spread with crushed rocks that remove carbon dioxide from the atmosphere.

"We're able to turn the lowest-grade land in the world into some of the most lucrative land in the world," says Eric Matzner at Metalplant, the start-up behind the flower farm.

The idea of mining with plants and other metal-gobbling organisms isn't new. Several companies and researchers aim to use greenery as a more environmentally friendly source of nickel for applications like electric vehicle batteries, and many other projects have used such plants to clean up contaminated soil. But only Metalplant is combining so-called "phytomining" with a method of removing CO2 from the atmosphere called enhanced rock weathering, which involves spreading large volumes of rock dust on farms. This dust can both capture CO2 and replenish the nickel taken up by the plants.

## **EPA Launches EJSCREEN 2.3, The Community Environmental Justice Mapping Tool & Trainings**

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has completed its annual update to EJScreen, the Agency's publicly available environmental justice (EJ) screening and mapping tool. EJScreen 2.3 makes important improvements to better meet the needs of users, including a redesigned and enhanced report, a new environmental indicator with corresponding indexes, and refreshed demographic and environmental data. The main purpose of these annual EJScreen updates is to incorporate the newest available demographic and environmental datasets.

EJScreen 2.3 makes important improvements to better meet the needs of users, including new environmental indicators and map layers, interface improvements, and updated demographic and environmental data. The new environmental indicators, with corresponding EJ and supplemental indexes, will map noncompliance of drinking water systems and satellite measured nitrogen dioxide levels in the air. EJScreen 2.3 will also features new map layers on extreme heat, modeled drinking water service areas, private drinking water wells, and EPA environmental justice grants.

This new version of EJScreen will make interface changes aimed at helping users better understand the data and modernizing aspects of the tool. The update will use the 2018-2022 American Community Survey demographic data from the U.S. Census and refreshed EPA data for the environmental indicators. More details on these changes are available on the Change Log website.

#### Wonders of the World: The Library at Alexandria



# The Library of Alexandria. The 20th anniversary of the reopening of the oldest government library in history



Today (April 25, 2022) marks the twentieth anniversary of the original date for the revival of the ancient Library of Alexandria in a huge project carried out by Egypt in partnership with the United Nations, to build the new Library of Alexandria in a site close to the old library in the Shatby area in Alexandria, and the global cultural celebration began with the opening of the Library of Alexandria in 2002, which It was scheduled to take place on April 23 of the same year, and was postponed due to the continued military escalation and the continuation of the Israeli aggression against the Palestinian people in the occupied land, which led to the outbreak of student demonstrations at that time, where the original opening took place on October 16, 2002.

A revival of the Old Library of Alexandria, the largest library of its era, in a huge project carried out by Egypt in partnership with the United Nations, where the library was rebuilt in a location close to the old library in the Shatby area of the city.

Historical accounts differed among historians about who built the Royal Library of Alexandria or the Great Library as it was called. Others say that it was founded by Ptolemy II, considering that he was the one who completed it. Ptolemy the First ordered the establishment and organization of the library at his expense, and then completed it by his successor, Ptolemy II.

There is also a difference in the year in which it was established. There are those who say that it was established in 330 BC, and there are those who say that it was established in 288 BC. Many believe that the Library of Alexandria is the first libraries in the world, but this is not true. The libraries of Pharaonic temples were known to the ancients. The Egyptians, but it was for the priests only.

Hence the greatness of the Royal Library of Alexandria, because it is the oldest public governmental library in the ancient world. It contains the largest collection of books in the ancient world, which numbered at that time to 700,000 volumes. The books and sciences of the Pharaonic and Greek civilizations were collected, and in it there was an event of scientific blending and intellectual cultural encounter with the sciences of the East and the sciences of the East, the West.

Its greatness is also due to the liberation of its scholars from the taboo of politics, religion, gender, race and discrimination.
