

 Biden-Harris Administration Releases Environmental Justice Science, Data, and Research Plan

Last week, the Biden-Harris Administration released a first-of-its kind government-wide Environmental

Justice Science, Data, and Research Plan.

The <u>Environmental Justice Science</u>, <u>Data</u>, <u>and Research Plan</u> was created to support federal agencies in the advancement of environmental justice. It features high level recommendations for identifying and addressing longstanding gaps, barriers, and missing science, data, and research relevant to environmental justice.

#### The four key recommendations include:

Enhancing meaningful involvement and engagement of the public.

Fortifying just treatment, equitable access, and protection from environmental injustice. Strengthening work and partnership with non-federal entities. Institutionalizing environmental justice.

#### Background:

The Environmental Justice Science, Data, and Research Plan is expected to be updated by the EJ Subcommittee biennially. Future topic areas may include cross agency coordination and communication, modeling, participatory science (including

community and citizen science), Indigenous Knowledge, and environmental health in areas of air, water, and land pollution. With this plan, the EJ Subcommittee will also inform and support strategies to identify, eliminate, mitigate, and prevent environmental

injustice at the federal, Tribal, state, territorial, and local levels.

This report was prepared by the Environmental Justice Subcommittee (EJ Subcommittee) of the National

Science and Technology Council (NSTC). The EJ Subcommittee consists of subject matter experts from across the executive branch, including the Environmental Protection Agency. This report was a whole of government endeavor and represents a dedicated effort to provide principles, information, and resources that can assist federal agencies. In addition, this report was informed by the comments and feedback provided by respondents to the Request for Information, listening sessions, and other comment opportunities.

The University of Minnesota will soon offer a doctoral degree in American Indian Studies, following up on a recommendation in a landmark report that called on school leaders to take steps to repair their relationship with tribes in the state. Just six universities in the United States offer a Ph.D. in American Indian Studies, and the Minnesota's program will be the first in the Midwest. #### Census Bureau Releases Strategies for 2030 Census

The U.S. Census Bureau released five strategy documents outlining how it plans to carry out the next decennial census. The strategies cover the Census Bureau's approach for conducting a complete count, designing operations, developing the IT solution, sourcing contracts and engaging with stakeholders for the 2030 Census.

- 2030 Census Strategy. Describes how the Census Bureau will accomplish its mission by building on key innovations from the 2020 Census, strategically engaging with partners, and leveraging ongoing Census Bureau innovations and existing operational and IT functions.
- 2030 Census Operations Strategy and Roadmap. Describes the iterative process for designing how the 2030 Census will be conducted, outlines how the design process will be managed and matured, and provides a roadmap of key activities and milestones along the way.
- 2030 Census IT Strategy and Roadmap. Documents the direction and priorities for identifying the IT components needed for the 2030 Census.
- 2030 Census Acquisition Strategy. Describes the strategy for sourcing contracts and ensuring they're in place in a timely and efficient manner to conduct the 2030 Census.
- 2030 Census Stakeholder Engagement Strategy. Describes the formal strategy for communicating and collaborating with stakeholders throughout the lifecycle of the 2030 Census.

Indian and Native American stakeholders are encouraged to stay informed to the census process and offer feedback as to how best Indian Country can participate and be accurately counted. The Census remains a primary source of information for determining funding levels for many federal programs tribes and tribal organizations receive. ## Engage Series on Apprentice Recruitment: Series Videos now Available

To help bridge partnerships between registered apprenticeship programs and jobseeker-serving tribal organizations, The U.S. Department of Labor's Office of Apprenticeship and its Division of Indian and Native American Programs recently hosted a three-part lunch-hour webinar series for tribal workforce one-stop centers and tribal college career services staff located throughout the Pacific Northwest.

In June, attendees were invited to the ENGAGE SERIES: Uniting Registered Apprenticeship Programs and Tribal Workforce/College Career Centers for Apprentice Recruitment to learn how to connect their program participants and students to nine vastly different federally registered apprenticeships in Washington State. Each webinar session consisted of 3 different sponsors sharing their program's occupations, application process, wages, cost, benefits, location, and other pertinent details.

The webinar was delivered as part of Safal Partners' US Department of Labor Registered Apprenticeship Technical Assistance (RA TA) Center of Excellence on Strategic Partnerships and System Alignment. 

The two-and-a-half-day conferences will focus on creating safer learning environments.

Participants will have access to informative 60-minute sessions, topic-specific workshops, and networking opportunities.
