



Native American athletes excelled at the 1912 Olympics in Sweden. Represented by Jim Thorpe (Sac & Fox), Lewis Tewanima (Hopi), and Andrew Sockalexis (Penobscot Nation), Thorpe won gold in the Decathlon/Pentathlon, Lewis won silver in the 10,000m run, and Sockalexis finished 4th in the marathon.

Across the Continent:

A Summer's Journey To the Rocky Mountain, the Mormons And the Pacific States With Speaker Colfax*

Samuel Bowles 1865 452 pages (available on the internet for free)

"It was a magnificent, uninterrupted stage ride of six hundred and fifty miles, much more endurable in its discomforts, much more exhilarating in its novelties, than I had anticipated."

"Little details like that give us some flavor of the 19th Century. To begin with the Overland Stage they were going to take came in a day and a half late. It had been attacked by Indians. A party of "converted rebels" (i.e. former Southern soldiers – the Civil War had just ended a couple of months earlier) had also been attacked as had another stage. Here we can look at a very different time. Bowles cannot believe that the only answer to the Indian problem is extermination as some advocate. "This is dreadful if true." He reflects that the Indians have been provoked by the whites' bad faith to them "in the systematic manner they have been plundered and cheated and everyway abused by offices of the Government.." That soundslike kind of forward thinking but then he says if the policy is extermination, "the sooner it is adopted, and carried out, the better." It's 1865. He comes back to the Native Americans again and again in his narrative as they travel across the country. What little forward thinking he may have had rapidly disappears in his various descriptions.

It is interesting that the discussion of Indians and the soldiers accompanying the party goes on for pages and then the subject is returned to noting Indians caused the stage coach company half a million dollars in damage the previous year.

Times were very different."



Last week, I visited the Bennett Juniper tree. It's considered the largest and oldest juniper tree in the world—approximately 3,000 years old! The tree is in the Stanislaus National Forest and can be accessed from Hwy 108 on Forest Service roads, requiring the crossing of several creeks. It was discovered in the 1920s by Basque sheepherders and is named after Clarence Bennett, a naturalist who studied junipers throughout the Sierra. Experiencing and photographing this ancient tree was a very special and also humbling experience.

"With school starting back up soon. PLEASE TEACH YOUR CHILDREN NOT TO TEASE THAT LITTLE INDIGENOUS BOY WITH LONG HAIR! Teach your children the significance of long hair to prevent him from wanting to cut his hair because he's being bullied, having long hair has no gender! Braids are a symbol of strength, wisdom, and are something that reflects his identity. To that little indigenous boy with braids be proud of it because that was something your grandfathers couldn't have in residential school. In fact the first thing that happened to them was to have their braid cut off. So remember these things the next time someone is teasing a boy about their hair. Adults if you see or hear it stand up for him and stop it. They are not teasing him because something is wrong with him, they are doing it because something is wrong with THEM. Kids see you, a parent as an idol, the way you act reflects back on to your kids actions. If you're a bully, then your kids a bully. Teach them what's right from wrong. Simple as that. A healthy mind does not speak ill of others.
