Lead Hazard Reduction Grant Program

- **Summary:** The purpose of the Lead-Based Paint Hazard Reduction (LHR) grant program is to maximize the number of children under the age of six protected from lead poisoning by assisting states, cities, counties/parishes, Tribes, or other units of government in undertaking comprehensive programs to identify and control lead-based paint hazards in eligible privately-owned rental or owner-occupied housing populations. In addition, there is Healthy Homes Supplemental funding available that is intended to enhance the lead-based paint hazard control activities by comprehensively identifying and addressing other housing hazards that affect occupant health.

USDA Seeks Applications to Increase Homeownership Opportunities

U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced that it is accepting applications to increase homeownership for people in Tribal communities under the [Native Community Development Financial Institutions \(NCFI\) Relending Demonstration Program](#).

The purpose of the program is to increase homeownership opportunities for Native American Tribes, Alaska Native communities and Native Hawaiian communities.

USDA will provide the loans to qualified NCFIs that will relend the funds to eligible low- and very-low-income homebuyers to purchase, build, rehabilitate, improve or relocate dwellings on Tribal lands in rural areas. USDA is providing the funding under the [Single Family Housing Direct Loan Program](#).

Tribal Access to Emerging Private Markets for Climate Mitigation or Forest Resilience

USDA Forest Service announced a competitive grant opportunity authorized under the Inflation Reduction Act and is available to Tribal Nations, Tribal organizations and other Tribal entities specifically. The Forest Service is providing at least \$20M in competitive funds to support Tribal Nation participation in emerging private markets for climate mitigation or forest resilience. Examples of emerging markets and related proposed projects may include markets for water quality and quantity, carbon, biodiversity, and wetland restoration. **Deadline: August 21.**

Low-Income Communities Bonus Credit Program under Section 48(e)

Funding Announced To Increase Collaboration Between Regional Intertribal Organizations and DOE - \$3.6 Million Pilot To Increase Access to DOE Funding and Technical Assistance for Tribes

The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) announced up to \$3.6 million to increase collaboration with up to four non-profit regional intertribal organizations.

The “[Intertribal Organization Opportunity: Support for Tribal Clean Energy Communication and Engagement](#)” funding opportunity is focused on enhancing outreach and engagement to improve federally recognized Tribes’ navigation and access to DOE clean energy funding and technical assistance.

Eligible non-profit regional intertribal organizations may request up to \$300,000 annually for up to 3 years. Funding will support communication, internal organizational capacity-building, and engagement activities with the goal of building long-lasting effective working relationships between Tribal elected leaders and staff, and DOE.

This funding opportunity builds on the authorities granted to the DOE Office of Indian Energy under the Energy Policy Act of 2005, to accelerate the deployment of clean energy technology on Tribal lands. In addition to the \$75 million committed to Tribal energy projects selected in 2023, the Office of Indian Energy has invested over \$120 million in Native communities across the contiguous 48 states and Alaska since 2010.

These investments have resulted in more than 46 megawatts of new electricity generation installed—helping power more than 8,800 Tribal buildings and contributing meaningfully to the President’s [Justice40 Initiative](#) to provide 40% of the overall benefits of federal clean energy investments to disadvantaged and underrepresented communities.

President Lincoln’s Fourth State of the Union Address Dec 6, 1864

The usual discussion of relations with various other nations.

(Extract) “The organization and admission of the State of Nevada has been completed in conformity with law, and thus our excellent system is firmly established in the mountains, which once seemed a barren and uninhabitable waste between the Atlantic States and those which have grown up on the coast of the Pacific Ocean.

The Territories of the Union are generally in a condition of prosperity and rapid growth. Idaho and Montana, by reason of their great distance and the interruption of communication with them by Indian hostilities, have been only partially organized; but it is understood that these difficulties are about to disappear, which will permit their governments, like those of the others, to go into speedy and full operation. As intimately connected with and promotive of this material growth of the nation, I ask the attention of Congress to the valuable information and important recommendations relating to the public lands, Indian affairs, the Pacific Railroad, and mineral discoveries contained in the report of the Secretary of the Interior which is herewith transmitted,

and which report also embraces the subjects of patents, pensions, and other topics of public interest pertaining to his Department.

The great enterprise of connecting the Atlantic with the Pacific States by railways and telegraph lines has been entered upon with a vigor that gives assurance of success, notwithstanding the embarrassments arising from the prevailing high prices of materials and labor. The route of the main line of the road has been definitely located for 100 miles westward from the initial point at Omaha City, Nebr., and a preliminary location of the Pacific Railroad of California has been made from Sacramento eastward to the great bend of the Truckee River in Nevada. Numerous discoveries of gold, silver, and cinnabar mines have been added to the many heretofore known, and the country occupied by the Sierra Nevada and Rocky mountains and the subordinate ranges now teems with enterprising labor, which is richly remunerative. It is believed that the product of the mines of precious metals in that region has during the year reached, if not exceeded, one hundred millions in value.

It was recommended in my last annual message that our Indian system be remodeled. Congress at its last session, acting upon the recommendation, did provide for reorganizing the system in California, and it is believed that under the present organization the management of the Indians there will be attended with reasonable success. Much yet remains to be done to provide for the proper government of the Indians in other parts of the country, to render it secure for the advancing set-tier, and to provide for the welfare of the Indian. The Secretary reiterates his recommendations, and to them the attention of Congress is invited.

Printed in Cambridge between 1660 and 1663, the Eliot Indian Bible today represents a landmark in printing history: It was translated into the Wampanoag language of the region's Algonquin tribes and was the first Bible printed in North America in any language. In recent decades, the Wampanoag nation has used the Eliot Bible as a tool to help resurrect its ancestral language. The Library (*of Congress*) preserves a 1685 copy.

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
