The US Department of Housing and Urban Development and the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Indian Health Service (IHS) have published a <u>Dear Tribal Leader letter</u>, extending the Tribal Consultation period seeking Tribes' feedback and recommendations on how HUD and IHS programs can better address housing-related water and sewer infrastructure needs within Tribal communities.

HUD is announcing the launch of the **Secretary's Award for Excellence in Tribal Communities**. This prestigious new award acknowledges innovative approaches, best practices, policies, and community engagement that make significant contributions to serving HUD-assisted Tribal residents. Awards will be considered under the following priority areas: Community Development, New Housing Construction, Supporting Native Youth, and Honoring

Guidance on Applicability of Build America Buy America Act (BABA) Requirements to Housing Projects

The OMB Made in America Office has provided additional guidance to Federal Agencies regarding the applicability of BABA requirements to housing projects.

Consistent with Implementation Guidance on Application of Buy America Preference in Federal Financial Assistance Programs for Infrastructure (M-24-02), single family housing projects (buildings consisting of 1-4 dwelling units) are considered "private." Accordingly, BABA requirements will not apply to HUD Federal Financial Assistance used to fund the construction, maintenance, alteration, or repair of such housing, as such projects are not properly classified as public infrastructure projects for purposes of BABA. However, BABA requirements will apply to projects involving the construction, maintenance, alteration, or repair of housing with 5 or more units (multifamily housing projects).

ONAP will issue additional guidance and update existing guidance for Tribal Recipients relating to BABA and housing projects soon. For now, ONAP encourages all Tribal Recipients to review PIH Notice 2024-35 closely and hold clarifying questions to ONAP staff. We are working on FAQs and will be updating BABA guidance soon to incorporate this new guidance from OMB.

<u>HUD Imminent Threat Grants</u> – Set aside of the Indian Community Development Block Grant (ICDBG) allocation for non-competitive, first come-first serve grants to eliminate or lessen problems which pose an imminent threat to public health or safety of Tribal residents. **Application Deadline: Ongoing** and may be submitted at any time.

HUD Deploys Funding Navigator to Connect Program Participants, including Tribes and TDHEs, to Billions of Dollars in Federal Funding and Tax Credits to Improve Carbon Reduction and Climate Resilience

HUD deployed the <u>Funding Navigator</u>, an interactive tool that allows the user to browse and sort funding opportunities for billions of dollars in funding available under the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) and Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL). Tribes and TDHEs will be able to focus their search for funding available to federally recognized Tribes. In addition, Tribes can find existing technical assistance resources for climate resiliency, energy efficiency, renewable energy, and environmental justice at <u>Build for The Future</u> and <u>ONAP's Tribal Climate Resilience and Adaptation</u>. The White House released an <u>updated technical assistance guide</u> that focuses on federal and state technical assistance programs aimed at accessing and deploying Bipartisan Infrastructure Law and Inflation Reduction Act funding. This new guide highlights programs that help communities navigate programs and resources that can help them deliver infrastructure, clean energy, and climate resilience projects.

EPA's Community Change Equitable Resilience Technical Assistance

The Community Change Equitable Resilience program will provide free design and project

development assistance, community engagement, and partnership development workshops. Climate resilience projects that qualify for technical assistance include a focus on new or expanded green infrastructure, open spaces, and/or retrofits of existing community buildings or streets to address climate change impacts (such as extreme heat and more intense heat islands, wildfire and smoke, floods, storms, or other climate impacts that pose a greater risk to disadvantaged communities). Requests for technical assistance are now being accepted on a rolling basis until 50 recipients have been identified. Eligible projects must show the following:

- Intent and eligibility to apply for a grant under the Community Change Grant Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO);
- Agreement to host EPA contractors for site visits;
- Project location in a disaster-prone area;
- Site description, ownership status, and environmental and land use information (if available);
- Potential resilience benefits for disadvantaged community; and
- Engagement opportunities.

White House Technical Assistance Guide

The White House recently released a new <u>technical assistance guide</u> that simplifies access to infrastructure, climate resilience, and clean energy funding for Tribes, states, local jurisdictions, and other communities. The guide provides comprehensive information about more than 100 federal technical assistance programs that can support efforts to win federal funding and deploy it in communities across the nation.

DOE Offers Tribes \$225 Million in Rebates for Home Electrification and Appliances

The U.S. Department of Energy has released application guidelines for tribal governments to apply for \$225 million in funding under the Inflation Reduction Act's Home Electrification and Appliance Rebate (HEAR) program. HEAR funds will provide rebates to low- and moderate-income households installing efficient electric technologies. Rebates for home electrification upgrades range from \$840 to \$14,000 per household. Rebate amounts vary depending on a household's income, the total project cost, and the technologies installed. Multifamily and single-family buildings, including manufactured housing, may be eligible for rebates. Eligible households may be owner-occupied or rented. Once DOE has approved a tribe's HEAR application, the tribe may launch its program and begin issuing rebates. Tribal officials can review the published guidance in DOE's new <u>Administrative and Legal Requirements</u> <u>Document</u>.

DOE has also released the <u>final funding amounts</u> individual tribes will receive after DOE approves their applications, as well as an <u>explanation of how it allocated the funds</u>.

Our initial target group is young at risk women. We are deeply concerned about the staggering number of Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women (MMIW) and the recent heart breaking cases of young women on Montana Reservations. These cases emphasized the lack of resources, limited investigation and institutional apathy when Native women are reported missing in ontana.

We intend to serve as advocates and community liaisons and will network with other organizations, foundations and institutions who share our vision to support and empower Native women. One of our first activities, A Self-Defense workshop, was held on December 2019, at Montana State University in Bozeman. The event was made possible by our networking with the community, area professionals and the MSU chapter of MMIW. We hope to network with others on Montana reservations to offer this program as well as establishing talking circles and oport groups in the future.
