Sharing the wonder

On December 24, 1968, Apollo 8 astronaut Bill Anders captured an image that had never been seen before in human history: **the planet Earth rising above the horizon of the moon**.

Anders and fellow astronauts Frank Borman and James Lovell had traveled nearly a quarter million miles to orbit the moon but, at that moment, unexpectedly found themselves captivated by their home planet.

"Here we came to study that moon and yet, it was this gorgeous earth rise, this colorful, delicate-looking planet coming up that, in my view, was the most spectacular view of the whole flight."

Back on Earth, an estimated one in four across the globe tuned in for a special Christmas Eve television broadcast from the crew. As they orbited the moon, Borman, Lovell, and Anders transmitted images of the lunar surface, before taking turns reading from the book of Genesis.

As one of the **most turbulent years in American history** came to a close, astronauts from the **first crewed mission to the moon** gave the nation—and the world—a sense of perspective and hope.
