Many aspects of life and work — including housing, clothing, crafts, transportation, education, and employment, are illustrated in this collection drawn from the extensive holdings of the University of Washington Libraries, the Cheney Cowles Museum/Eastern Washington State Historical Society, and the Museum of History and Industry in Seattle.

- Native American rights advocate, Dr. Joseph Kossuth Dixon, a former Baptist minister, undertook efforts to document the Native American experience during World War I with the hope that documenting Native American service in the military would aid the struggle to obtain general U.S. citizenship. Forty percent of Native Americans were not citizens until 1924, though more than 12,000 served in the U.S. Army during World War I. The achievements of this Yankton Sioux woman cover a wide array of disciplines but her advocacy for the rights of her people proved impactful on some U.S. government actions to benefit Native Americans.

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- Search [Congress.gov](#) to follow legislation affecting Native Americans. Ongoing efforts to protect their rights are seen through the introduction of bills both in the Senate and House of Representatives such as [H.R. 1694–Native American Voting Rights Act of 2019](#).
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- Listen to Native American music. [Omaha Indian Music](#) features traditional Omaha music from the 1890s and 1980s. The multiformat ethnographic field collection contains 44 wax cylinder recordings collected by Francis La Flesche and Alice Cunningham Fletcher between 1895 and 1897, 323 songs and speeches from the 1983 Omaha harvest celebration pow-wow, and 25 songs and speeches from the 1985 Hethu'shka Society concert at the Library of Congress. Photo of Lone Horn at the 1868 Fort Laramie treaty signing. We had the photo restored and colorized and found his face was painted. That was usually done to protect oneself, most likely from the photo either taking his shadow or because he was in a place of many soldiers. We included the original photo that the new photo was restored from. LONE HORN was one of Crazy Horse's maternal uncles. It was his vision of an agency where the graves of all our relatives that had gone to the other side would be on land that was ours. It was his proposed agency that Crazy Horse told the government he wanted as his own agency just prior to his being murdered. The photo was taken at the Fort Laramie treaty talks in 1868. 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## Open Planet Is a Growing Library of 4,500 Free Videos Documenting Nature and Climate Issues Around the World

Climate science has a communication problem. Abstract data, figures, and projections into the distant future can be tough to comprehend. Without effective storytelling tools to convey the severity of the crisis and what's at stake if we don't act, it can be difficult to motivate the broader public to advocate for change.

The team at [Open Planet](#) wants to bridge that gap. A collaboration between [Studio Silverback](#) and Carnegie Mellon's [CREATE Lab](#), the new digital library contains a growing collection of climate and nature footage available for free use.

An image search showed the earliest instance of this image being shared online was [a 2024 Facebook post](#) with the caption "The only reason Natives visit is to do this," suggesting a protest against the history of European colonization in the United States, which resulted in the mass and systematic killing of indigenous peoples.

Asked to explain his X post, a spokesperson for the French campaign said he did not mean to say the U.S. should deport all Native Americans, but only those in the photograph.

"Mr. French never called for the complete deportation of Native Americans," the spokesperson said in an email. "If you look at his actual tweet from last year (Oct 10, 2025), he was specifically talking about the four people in the picture who obviously hate America."

We replied to ask which country he thought these four Native Americans should be deported to and will update this report should we receive a response.

## The six most anticipated museum openings of 2026

### Larrakia Cultural Centre, Darwin

[The Larrakia Cultural Centre](#) is a striking new museum opening in September in Darwin, the capital of the Australia's Northern Territory. The harbourfront building has a roof shaped like a bird in flight, evoking an ancestral spirit. Built on the sacred land of the Indigenous Larrakia people, it's the latest example of a shift from museums about native people to museums owned and operated by them.

The Larrakia, who have lived in the region for tens of thousands of years, have been working on the project for decades. "The centre will be a place of truth-telling, learning and celebration," Malarndirri McCarthy, the country's Minister for Indigenous Australians, said in a statement. It's hoped that visitors will come to the museum before heading out to explore other Indigenous sites in the region with cultural ties to the Larrakia, such as [Kakadu National Park](#) and the [Tiwi Islands](#).

The A\$60m (£31.2m) centre is opening in September and will display traditional and ceremonial artefacts, some of which were repatriated only recently. Last year, the Fowler Museum at the University of California-Los Angeles returned a kangaroo-tooth headband and glass spear points that were acquired in the late 19th and early 20th Century. A few months later, Larrakia elders travelled to England to reclaim 33 spears, spear throwers and a club from the Bristol Museum & Art Gallery.

In addition to galleries and art studios, the centre will have an outdoor auditorium with sand performance and saltwater ceremonial areas and spaces to teach the Larrakia culture. It will also have a restaurant featuring indigenous flavours, and a shop selling Larrakia arts and crafts.

## **Sinking giant concrete orbs to the bottom of the ocean could store massive amounts of renewable energy**

About 2,000 feet beneath the ocean’s surface, in the dark stillness off the coast of California, a concrete sphere the size of a small house will soon have its moment. Its walls must resist pressures 77 times greater than what we feel at sea level. Yet it has no living inhabitants. Its cargo is not oil or gas. It’s electricity (sort of). This is *StEnSea* — Stored Energy in the Sea — a bold new venture that seeks to solve one of the greatest challenges of the clean energy age: how to store renewable energy when the wind stops blowing and the sun disappears. The concept is disarmingly simple. Picture a hollow concrete sphere on the seafloor. When excess power is available — say, from a nearby offshore wind farm — it’s used to pump seawater *out* of the sphere, creating a vacuum-like condition inside. Then, when energy is needed, a valve opens. Seawater rushes back in, driven by the crushing pressure of the ocean. As it re-enters, it spins a turbine, which generates electricity. The process is reversible and can be repeated hundreds of times per year. ... [Read more from ZME Science](#).

## **Tribes and allies form a coalition against the Delta Conveyance Project**

“Gary Mulcahy steps through tufts of wild rye spilling down a bank of the Sacramento River, tromping into a clearing where several men have their rods and reels fixed under the branches of a blue oak. Mulcahy has fished up and down this river for most of his life, beginning with catching salmon as a teen in Shasta County. Mulcahy was raised there in the homeland of his people, the Winnemem Wintu Tribe. Later, he would fish for sturgeon off boats near the riverbend he’s staring at now — the north gateway to the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta. This river is a part of him. Mulcahy, government liaison for the Winnemem Wintu, has been engaged in salmon and wildlife conservation for 25 years. In 2022, his tribe joined forces with the Shingle Springs Band of Miwok Indians, the Stockton-based Filipino cultural group Little Manila Rising and the conservation nonprofit Restore the Delta to form the Delta Tribal Environmental Coalition, or DTEC. This group was founded on shared conservation values and is actively opposing the Delta Conveyance System, better known as the Delta tunnel. ...” [Read more from Comstock’s](#).
